Year 1	Recognising my skills	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> All people are skilled at different things Each person has their own talents It is important that we recognise and celebrate that which we are good at We can use our skills and talents to think about what jobs we might want to do in the future
Year 2	Jobs	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Jobs are the way in which adults earn a salary to get money to buy things Some people have one job whereas other people have a number of jobs Jobs use the skills and talents that we have When thinking about the type of job we want to do, we should think about our skills, talents and interests
Year 3	Aspirations	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> An aspiration is something that we want to do when we are older In terms of a career, an aspiration is a job that we are interested in doing when we leave school It is important that our aspirations are linked to the skills and talents that we have We should also aspire to do a job that we enjoy Not all people are going to be able to do the one job that they aspire to – some jobs have limited spaces (e.g. being a professional footballer) It is important that we work hard in all areas so that should our aspirations change, we have the skills required for many different jobs
Year 4	Qualifications	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Many qualifications require you to take an exam to show you have the knowledge in this area GCSEs are a qualification you get when you are 16 – often you take between 7 and 13 GCSEs A-levels are a qualification you get when you are 18 – usually you take 3 or 4 A levels A degree is studied when you leave school and go to university – you usually only study one subject in a degree Different jobs require different qualifications – these are linked to the skills you need in this job
Year 5	University	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> A university is a place where you study a degree Many jobs require you to have a degree A degree usually takes 3 years of study Many people live away from home to study a degree – living on or near a campus where lectures (lessons) take place Many people see university as a part of growing up because you live away from home and have to act independently
Year 6	Gender Stereotypes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> A stereotype is a usually oversimplified and inaccurate conception held in common by many people. In society there are some jobs that are seen (by some) as more suitable to males or more suitable to females Jobs should not be seen as gender specific – it is important to make decisions about your future based on your interest and skills In some professions, males are paid more than females for the same work that they do – this is known as a gender pay gap The gender pay gap is something that is unfair because people are doing the same work for a different salary
