Literacy



Yesterday you practised forming the letter **c** and today you can practise forming the letter **o** correctly.

Some of you might think that forming the letter **o** is very easy, but it is important to make sure that you go around the correct way when writing this.

When you are practising letter formation, remember that you do not need to do this on paper. You could practise in paint, sand, goop, playdough or even mud, and you can use fingers, sticks, brushes, or indeed anything you can think of to practise forming the letters correctly.

I hope you are all continuing to practise ordering the letters in your name. Remember that **only** the **first** letter should be a capital letter. The other letters should all be lower case.

Mathematics



Careful Counting.

Today I would like you to carefully count lots of small things that are the same.

Try to find some paper cake cases and then you write a number, or ask an adult to write a number in each one.

Some of you will want to write numbers to 5, some to 10, and some beyond 10.

Ask an adult to help you find **small** things that you can put in the cake cases. You could use raisins, beans, counters, buttons, or indeed small objects that you can find.

See if you can put the correct number of items in each paper case.

If you haven't got any cake cases at home, you can place your small objects on your number cards.
